Four forces make up this dance: festival staff, festival participants, the sprung floor and the untapped energy of the non-festival-goers.

Blissed Out in the Redwoods

Thirty minutes of uninterrupted waltzing! Gourmet dining with breaks for dancing! Midnight flash-lit strolls among the towering

trees! Accordion serenades (six instruments). Chocolate tasting! High Tea! These are only a few of the activities I enjoyed during English Dance Week at Mendocino Woodlands July 10–17.

For the uninitiated, English Country Dance (ECD) is a form of set dancing which predates the more familiar contra. Generally speaking, tunes are specific to individual dances made up of basic moves in simple or intricate patterns, usually in straight sets of three, four, or more couples, in tempos ranging from the sedate to the rowdy. To me the music is sublime—mostly composed during the 17th and 18th centuries. Graceful and flowing with turning instead of spinning figures, this dance form requires eye

contact which can be both subtle and flirtatious. This is happy dancing, very satisfying, and not at all hazardous to your health.

English Week happens in Mendocino Woodlands Campground No. 1 located a few miles and a dirt road east of Mendocino in the

redwoods. 30s-era redwood cabins are scattered over the hills and meadow with centrally located showers and toilets no more than a quarter mile from any bunk. A large camp house contains "Jeff's Gourmet Kitchen" plus dining and meeting rooms. Down slope is a big airy dance hall.

The English Week camp staff was outstanding. Philippe Callens, a personable and lively dancing master from Antwerp, Belgium, taught daily classes in Contemporary ECD, ECD for Experienced Dancers, and ECD to Classical music (try Mozart and Beethoven!). Carl Dreher from Texas held workshops in beginning ECD and Rapper Sword. Andra Horton, from Vermont, taught clogging and Molly

dancing and offered a session for Morris forepersons. Liz Dreisbach from Seattle, a wild woman on woodwinds, led a band workshop

and a slow jam. Bruce Hamilton from Palo Alto showed us how to overcome bad habits and inertia to become better dancers. Another Texan, Phyllis Richmond, demonstrated the Alexander Technique as applicable to singers, dancers and musicians. Doug Olsen, from the East Bay, led us in rousing song whenever the spirit moved as well as during a daily workshop.

Staff musicians, mostly from the Bay Area, were wonderfully talented, creative, and just plain fun to be around. Several campers also played for the evening dances and impromptu happenings. No one will forget petite, dark eyed Karen, who brought her tuba all the way from Brooklyn.

Though campers came mostly from West Coast states, others traveled from Texas, Wisconsin, New York, Missouri, Tennessee, Colorado and Arizona. Ages of dancers ranged from the twenties to the seventies plus delightful Sachi, age six months, who came attached to her mom Jules, a vigorous Morris dancer.

It was a great week! High points for me were all of Philippe's classes, the bliss of 15-minute and 20-minute waltz medleys, eating, and just soaking in all that wonderful MUSIC!

That Little Gender Imbalance Problem

One of the few gripes that I hear coming up again and again from dancers is the dilemma presented by more men than women, or vice versa, on the dance floor. Even at dance camps, where gender balance is a more controlled factor, there will be constant flux in the dancer mix.

However, I have seen a few creative solutions handling it as an opportunity rather than a problem. Caller and dancer awareness of this might help to resolve the issue.

In dancing with a same gender partner, it's important to remember that while moves such as allemandes, do-si-dos, and stars are gender symmetrical, swings and chains are asymmetrical with respect to gents' and ladies' positions. Each dance will have its own balance of symmetry and

asymmetry as a result.

Sometimes, same gender partners will switch roles at each end of the dance (not changing sides in an improper dance and/ or changing sides in a proper dance). A switch may even be feasible at a midpoint, or each time through depending on the dance. Other approaches include a three partner "couple" with two same gender and one opposite gender partner, with the same gender partners alternating dancing and waiting out either at each end or each time through the dance.

There may be other more creative solutions that I myself have not observed. Being an amateur caller myself, I won't pretend to be an expert, but will share the advice that I've heard from some of the best callers there are to "Enjoy what we create, whatever that may be."
